SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

2021

The 2021 School Improvement Plan highlights the continuation of a number of important priorities from 2019 and 2020 with an emphasis on consolidating these key elements and avoiding the introduction of major new initiatives. This also occurs against a backdrop of significant disruption through the 2020 global pandemic and the ongoing threat that this poses into 2021.

College Master Plan development:

- Following extensive consultation and community input the developed and finalised first edition of the College's new Master Plan will be presented to community. This will articulate an ongoing staged plan for redevelopment or new addition to our built environment and learning facilities.
- A number of initial Master Plan improvements and new developments within the campus's learning environment, will be initiated in 2021.
- The first phase of these developments, a new Change Room facility, will be completed in Term One 2021 along with the relocation of the College's IT technical support offices and changes within the College eLearning Centre that will emphasise its importance as our central information hub.

Ongoing Implementation and application of Digital Technology for improved Learning Management Systems and Teaching and Learning:

- Continued implementation and application of SEQTA LMS in second year cycle.
- Refinement of Remote Learning practices and Learning Continuity Plan in the event of student's being required to learn from home.
- Consolidation of alternative senior secondary pathways that partner with Universities or tertiary providers to provide greater options at senior level. (Certificate IV in Business with Stirling Business College, Uni Ready enabling course with Curtin University, etc.)

Extending College Pastoral Programmes:

- Consolidating the College's "Into Adulthood" Transition Programme for the middle years that commenced in 2020. Modelled along a rites of passage approach, this programme extends our current Year 9 Pastoral Care programme and Camp into a more extensive and meaningful year-long programme, tailored specifically for adolescents at this particular period.
- Continue to refine our Pastoral Care Framework and weekly PC period with attention to the pastoral and wellbeing needs of students at various year levels. This includes our Child Safe practices, Wellbeing initiatives and projects, Seasons for Growth programme, the Catholic Curriculum and Cyber Safety.
- Extend and continue our ongoing commitment to Aboriginal Education and specific initiatives and scholarship offerings.
- Renewing the College's approach to Restorative Practice in dealing with behaviour management issues and building positive relationships.
