In my language fire means Kaarl or Kaala meaning campsite. Kaarla to my old people and significantly my Nan, meant home. She grew up on farms in the bush where fire was very important to them. Where the Kaarla was, meant food and warmth, but most importantly it meant family and love. The Kaarla was where yarns happened. Where cultural knowledge was passed down through our family. It's where dreamtime stories were shared and where language was spoken. Fire means much more than just a flame to my Elders. It's a part if their spirit, who they are, who I am.

Our Elders were the torch bearers igniting and carrying the flame. They have passed this torch down to us to continue the legacy of what they started, keeping the fire burning for generations to come.

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
